

Tonight, we are also celebrating the impact and vibrance of local Scouting. Our council has seen families coming back to Scouting after time apart during the height of Covid. Councilmember Pam Foley was first elected to the San José City Council in November of 2018 to represent District 9, which includes the Cambrian Park, South Willow Glen, and Robertsville neighborhoods in the southwest corner of San José, bordering Campbell and Los Gatos. In 2022, Councilmember Foley ran unopposed and was re-elected to a second term to continue serving the District she's called home for the past 32 years.



Prior to taking office on the San José City Council, Pam served for 14 years as a Trustee on the San José Unified School District Board. During her tenure on the school board, she oversaw the education of 31,000 students and a budget of \$400,000,000. In December 2017, she completed her third term as Board President.

Councilmember Foley is one of six children born and raised in Portland, Oregon. Pam and her husband, Mike, married in 1983 and purchased their first home together in the Cambrian Area of San José in 1987. After a brief move to the Santa Cruz Mountains, they moved into their current home where they raised their daughter, Katelin.

Together, Pam and her husband continue operating Foley Mortgage, their family-run mortgage company founded in 1957.

In addition to representing City Council District 9, Pam serves as the chair of the Community & Economic Development Committee and the Vision Zero Task Force, whose focus is to reduce fatalities on our streets. Additionally, she has supported several organizations that assist children with developmental and physical disabilities including the Cambrian Park Little League Challenger Division Team and BAWSI Rollers.

She dedicates her spare time to volunteering with the Rotary Club of San José with the Youth Exchange Committee and the Enterprise Leadership Conference Committee.

In 2019, she was recognized by BAYMEC as an LGBTQ+ ally having received the Stan Haiduk Award.

She is proud to have received the Boy Scouts of America Character Award in 2017 and is honored to be a part of the celebration in recognizing the good work of this year's recipients.

Order of the Arrow

Tonight's flag ceremony is performed by the Saklan Lodge, Order of the Arrow.

The Order of the Arrow is the honor society of the Boy Scouts of America, composed of Scouts and Scouters who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives as elected by their peers.

For over 100 years, the Order of the Arrow (OA) has recognized Scouts and Scouters who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives. This recognition provides encouragement for others to live these ideals as well.



Inducted members, known as Arrowmen or Brothers (regardless of gender; as BSA and its programs are open to all genders), are organized into local youth-led lodges that harbor fellowship, promote camping, and render service to Boy Scout councils and their communities. Each



lodge corresponds to a BSA council in the area. Lodges are further broken down into chapters, which correspond to a district in scouting.

Members wear identifying insignia on their uniforms, most notably the OA pocket flap that

represents their individual OA lodge and the OA sash worn at official OA functions. The OA program sponsors several events, awards, and training functions.

The symbol of our council's local chapter, the Saklan Lodge, is everyone's favorite mollusk, the banana slug. This year's Lodge Chief is Bailey Palmaffy.

Council Highlights

8,086 youth served in 2021 in Scouting programs across four counties: Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, San Benito, and Monterey.

3,096 boys and girls ages 5-10 participated in Cub Scouts in 113 Packs with their families. They made friends, went on adventures, discovered new skills and experienced the joy of serving others.

4,490 girls and boys ages 11-18 participated in Scouts BSA in 170 Troops. They developed as leaders, served their community, went on adventures with friends and honed life skills.

304 high school youth took adventure to the next level in **Venturing and Sea Scouts**. They planned and executed their own adventures, explored hobbies, and worked together to make an impact in their communities.

197 young adults ages 14-20 discovered potential careers in Career Exploring. In partnership with Public Service & Safety Agencies, Hospitals, and Engineering firms, students design their own program and work with adult mentors to explore many aspects of their future careers.

378 youth earned the highest rank of Eagle Scout, a distinction of a leadership and strong character that will stay with them for life.

25 young women earned the rank of Eagle Scout since our Inaugural Class of Female Eagle Scouts.

Scouts improved the community with 135,000+ hours of service projects.

1,821 Scouts experienced summer or day camp.

6,000 attendees at Scout-O-Rama, our largest community serving event.

The quality programs and life shaping experiences were delivered by **4,350** dedicated volunteers.

Ron Gonzales

Ron Gonzales is the President and CEO of the Hispanic Foundation of Silicon Valley. The Foundation is dedicated to improving the quality of life for Silicon Valley Latinos.

Gonzales has over 40 years of technology and public policy experience. Prior to leading the Hispanic Foundation, Gonzales was Founder, Chairman and CEO of Presencia, LLC which provided marketing and sales consulting services.

He also served as Mayor of San José, the Capital of Silicon Valley and the nation's 10th largest city from 1999-2006.

His achievements included:

- Nationally recognized initiatives for strong neighborhoods,
- · Improved public education
- · Effective solutions to affordable housing
- Regional transportation projects.

Mayor Gonzales may be best known for championing the extension of the Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) to San Jose and Silicon Valley. So much so that former San Francisco Mayor Willie Brown nicknamed him "Mayor BART".

Before his election as Mayor, Gonzales worked as an executive with the Hewlett-Packard Company, in the areas of marketing, human resources, and corporate philanthropy.

Gonzales served for eight years (1989-1996) on the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors.

He currently serves as Chair of the Silicon Valley Capital Club Board of Governors, and Board Member of KIPP Northern California Public Charter Schools, and SV@Home.





Vice Mayor Charles "Chappie" Jones was elected to the San José City Council in November of 2014 with close to 60% of the popular vote. He represents City Council District 1, the region of West San José that borders the cities of Campbell, Cupertino, Santa Clara and Saratoga. Chappie was born in Sacramento and moved to San José in the 1990's.

His upbringing instilled a strong sense of civic responsibility and made him into a strong advocate

of civil service, fiscal responsibility, and community engagement.

Prior to his election, Chappie worked in the private sector where he held sales and marketing management positions with Apple and AT&T, was an Executive Manager with Cornerstone Consulting and Technology, and owned a technology service business.

Chappie assumed the role of Chair of the Santa Clara County Valley Transportation Authority (VTA) on January 1st, 2022. In addition to his new responsibilities, Chappie serves as President of the Cities Association of Santa Clara County (CASCC), Chair of the San José Small Business Advisory Task Force, and numerous other boards and commissions.



Jason was raised in Mission Viejo, CA, and started his career in community service while still in high school working after school in the Saddleback Valley Unified School District Recreation Department. There, he helped run after school programs, sports leagues, day camps, summer camps, and special events through college.

While majoring in political science at University California, Irvine, Jason took advantage of his love of sports as a Public Relations Intern for the Los Angeles Rams and the Los Angeles Lakers. He worked with several well-known coaches, players, and broadcasters along the way. Ask him about these experiences; he has several funny stories to share.

Although he was not in Scouting as a youth, an advertisement for an entry level position with the Boy Scouts of America piqued his interest. Little did he know this would become his profession for 33 years, moving four times throughout the state of California, including San Jose, where he and his wife, Debbie, currently reside with their dog, Charlie.

Throughout these moves, Jason and Debbie raised three daughters who are each grounded people of stalwart character. Rachel and Rebekah remain local as a hospital nurse and a marketing executive, respectively; and Hannah is a marketing executive in Manhattan.

Jason has always exuded a sense of trustworthiness. In his youth as a wingman, that trait helped attract single women to his eligible buddies during happy hour. In his personal and professional life, that trait has been a magnet for people pursuing his counsel.

Jason's ability to quickly study people and assess situations with objectivity has provided clarity and truth to those who seek it.

Jason's moral compass was a natural fit with the modeling expected for a career in Scouting. He maintained a strong sense of loyalty to the profession and with those he worked, establishing life-long relationships with volunteers and fellow professional Scouters. He sustained high expectations for himself and others, and supported and celebrated their achievement. Jason is known to provide strategic advice on matters pertaining to finance, personal and professional relationships, career choices, and professional decision-making. He naturally works as a coach helping people decide for themselves what is the best course of action

Some would say Jason IS a character. A bit of a movie and music aficionado, Jason prides himself on his ability to draw obscure quotes and trivia from random films and music of all genres.

Combining his equally matched sense of humor, no one is safe from his impromptu comedic impressions of people from all walks of life: from celebrities to family and friends. As a result of these traits, Jason's children have been raised in a home full of love and laughter.

Jason began his professional career with the Boy Scouts in Orange County in 1989, serving in various capacities including District Executive, Public Relations Director and Field Director. In 1997, the family moved to San Francisco Bay

Area Council where Jason ultimately served as the Chief Development Officer, raising over \$2,000,000 through annual giving, special events, and foundations

Moving back to Orange County in 2001, Jason served the role of Chief Operating Officer for the Orange County Council where he was principally responsible for membership, field operations and fundraising. Orange County Council enjoyed 38 consecutive months of membership growth in the traditional Cub and Boy Scout programs under Jason's leadership, a record nearly unmatched in the history of the Boy Scouts of America.

In 2004, Jason was selected as Scout Executive/CEO of the Silicon Valley Monterey Bay Council. During his nearly 18 year tenure, many significant positive organizational changes occurred.

Highlights include:

- Growth of total financial net assets by 1600%
- Increasing the annual budget by 226%

- Fundraising and building over \$20 million of major property improvements at Camps Hi-Sierra, Chesebrough, Pico Blanco and the Service Center.
- · Successfully merging the Santa Clara County and the Monterey Bay Area Councils in 2012
- Dramatically increasing programmatic growth in new or reinvented events (Scout-O-Rama, Character Awards, Sporting Clays, Golf Tournament)
- Doubling summer camp attendance and growing year-round camper nights

Jason also guided the council through several public relations challenges, and led constituents through a pandemic with fiscal stability and no staff layoffs. Five strategic plans were developed during his tenure, he helped recruit hundreds of board members, and he feels blessed to have partnered with nine outstanding council presidents.

Jason is very proud of Scouting opening doors to all youth regardless of sexual orientation or gender. He worked behind the scenes, advocating with Scouting leadership to finally achieve this. Although his daughter Rachel participated in both the Police and Medical Explorer Scouting Programs, Jason wished these changes to Scouting had come earlier so he could have shared them with all

Over the years, Jason has been involved in volunteering as time allowed. He served on the board of the Rotary Club of San Jose, as well as Membership Involvement Chair, and other activities. He also coached his children on

> Participating in family life, spending time with friends, and tending to preferred activities of being a gym rat, playing competitive tennis, and cheering on his beloved 49ers football team filled the rest of his

personal calendar.

Jason finally hung up his Scout uniform after 18 years as Scout Executive of the Silicon Valley Monterey Bay Council and 33 years in the profession. He looks forward to the next chapter of how he can continue to serve the greater community.



Lynne Yamaichi

Lynne was born and raised in San Jose, California to parents Earl and Helen Santo. Her paternal grandparents, Seizo and Taka (Kawahara) Santo immigrated from Shimane, Japan and her maternal grandparents, Shoroku and Umeko (Yoshiyama) Kodama immigrated from Hiroshima, Japan. Lynne has three siblings - Mark, Scott and Leslie.

Lynne's great uncle, George, started Santo Market in 1946 in San Jose's Japantown. The market provided Japanese groceries and goods to the families who returned to the San Jose area after being incarcerated during World War Il. To accommodate the many farmers in the area, the store would always open early and closed late at night. After serving two years in the U.S. Army, Lynne's father joined Santo Market full time in 1954. Throughout the decades, Santo Market served the Issei, Nisei, and the generations that follow along with the local Japantown community and the greater San Jose area.

Santo Market became a family business when Lynne's mother, Helen, joined the store as the bookkeeper. The store became a second home to Lynne and her siblings. Throughout the years, each returned to lend a hand - Mark helped manage the store, Leslie computerized the bookkeeping, Scott maintained the facility and Lynne always kept busy by helping with a little bit of everything. Lynne, Leslie and Scott would also assist with the deli preparations. The next generation, the nine grandchildren, have been helping at the store from an early age and continue to today. Lynne's father, Earl, worked until he was 89 years old when the pandemic kept him home. In June of this year, he passed away peacefully surrounded by his family. He took comfort knowing Santo Market's legacy would continue through his children and grandchildren.

The San Jose Buddhist Church Betsuin has always been an important part of

Lynne's life. She attended Sunday School (Dharma School) from preschool through high school. Saturday mornings at the Betsuin were spent going to Japanese School for many years. In 1971, the Sunday School performed a play, Fushigina Sekai, a Japanese version of Alice in Wonderland. Lynne played "Namiko," the role of "Alice," since she had a background in Japanese odori (dance) and Japanese language. Lynne was also a member of the



Junior Young Buddhist Association (Jr. YBA) organization in high school. As a parent, she was a Jr. YBA advisor for her three children. Currently, Lynne is a member of the Betsuin's Buddhist Women's Association, Dana (giving) Club and the EcoSahgha group.

Scouting was a big part of Lynne's childhood as her father was the first Cub Master at the Betsuin in 1969. Her parents helped start Cub Scout Pack 611 for their son Mark and later joined by Scott shortly after. Growing up, Lynne was a Brownie Girl Scout in the Empire Gardens School program. On Tuesdays, she would proudly wear her Brownie uniform to school in anticipation and excitement for her after school Brownie meetings where she would place her 10 cent dues in the coffee can. At the Betsuin, Lynne was also a member of the inaugural Girl Scout Troop 260 and her sister, Leslie, joined Brownie Troop 1052. The Betsuin's Girl Scout and Boy Scout organizations continued to grow into a thriving part of the community. As a parent, Lynne was the co-Girl Scout troop leader for 13 years for her daughter's troop.

> Outside of Sunday School and Girl Scouts, Lynne was also a member of the San Jose Community Youth Service (CYS) where she learned tap and ballet as well as basketball. She had the opportunity to play basketball against teams from the Bay Area and Los Angeles.

From the age of six, Lynne began her study of Buyo, Japanese Classical Dance. She was fortunate to be a student of Madame Bando Mitsusa, where Lynne and her fellow dancers would perform at church events, community activities, and festivals. She participated in parades such as the San

Francisco Cherry Blossom Festival and the Los Angeles Nissei Week. Years of studying Buyo culminated in the remarkable recitals of Madame Bando Mitsusa. In 1993, Lynne obtained her Natori rank from Bando Mitsugoro IX and was given the stage name Bando Misashizu. Lynne's three daughters were also students of Madame Bando Mitsusa. While her daughters attended Suzume no Gakko, a summer cultural program, Lynne was the odori

(Japanese dance) instructor. Lynne continues her joy of odori as she has recently joined the Betsuin's Obon

odori assistant instructors.

Lynne graduated from San Jose High School and is very proud to be a Bulldog to this day. She played basketball, tennis, softball, field hockey, and was also on the cheerleading team. From the University of California at Davis, Lynne earned her BS in Human Development. At UC Davis, she was inspired by her Professor Dr. David Lynn who taught the Life Span Course: Infancy and Early Childhood. Lynne enjoyed the Practicum course since she was able to work in the Early Childhood Education laboratory. It was Dr. Lynn and her participation in these two courses that inspired her to pursue a career working in Early Childhood Education



With the support from the Betsuin and the guidance of the Lotus Preschool

Board of Directors, Lotus Preschool opened

in 1986. Before becoming the Director, Lynne worked as a teacher while also taking on the responsibilities of the Director. Lynne appreciates the unconditional support from her sister, Leslie, that has aided in the success of Lotus Preschool throughout the years. The dedicated and caring Lotus staff incorporates Japanese Culture into the preschool curriculum. The children learn through cultural songs, taiko (Japanese drums), cooking projects and celebrating Japanese holidays.

Lotus attends daily service in the Hondo (temple) officiated by Rinban Sakamoto and Mikame Sensei. Children offer incense during the sutra chanting and recite The Golden Chain, "..to be kind and gentle to every living thing...", words Lynne has lived by all her life. Lotus has always been a place to learn through fun and play while immersing the children into the Japanese Culture, local community and the spirit of giving back.


